Joanna Vidaurre-Trujillo

Author/Poet and educator, Vidaurre-Trujillo was born in Embudo, New Mexico, and raised in the Cuchilla Pelada in the upper end of Llano de San Juan Nepomuceno, a small agricultural village situated thirty miles south of Taos, New Mexico. She has served as a commissioner on her local acequia, and has recently published *Papas y Frijoles Short Stories and Poems to Honor My Culture.*



David & Maximiño Manzanares

David Manzanares (he/him) and Maximino Manzanares (she/they) are from Abiquiu, New Mexico. They are son and grandchild of Herman and Eleanor Manzanares. They and their family have been parciantes on the Abeyta-Trujillo Acequia for four generations. As small children, their father and uncle played guitar while the family danced and sang the rancheras, corridos, huapangos, boleros and valses of another era. Their gift of music carries the tradition forward to the next generation.



Teatro Acequiero

Teatro Acequiero is a community theater group that presents short "actos" - politically charged and comically infused plays. Its mission is to entertain and teach, through popular education, acequia values to audiences of all ages. Its goal is to affirm acequia customs, traditions and culture.

El Agua y el aceite no se mezclan - This acto presents a clash of cultural values between Doña Agua and Don Aceite, characters who personify water and oil. Through their dialogue, they argue over who is truly best for the people. This acto is based on the locally known trovo of el atole y el café and adapted by Estevan Arellano. *Teatristas: Yolanda Jaramillo and Dabi S. García.*

AI Acequia Intelligence - This acto explores the challenges faced by the acequia community of Poca Agua as participation in local meetings declines. With their decision-making power fading, the community's commission is overtaken by an affluent landowner aiming to fully automate the acequia with an AI Mayordomo. Ultimately, the community discovers that affirming their cultural values can unite them against the capitalist aims of artificial intelligence. *Teatristas: Yolanda Jaramillo, Dabi S. Short Films: Acequia Apocalypse & Loving our Changing Homelands

NMAA will host a screening of two short films: Acequia Apocalypse and Loving our Changing Homelands followed by a discussion with *Miguel Santistevan* and *Paula Garcia*, moderated by *Laura Paskus*.

Acequia Apocalypse is an artistic expression to vent frustration at the loss of northern New Mexico culture by the process of progress, development, and gentrification. The expression is made by Miguel Santistevan, who has spend decades of his life trying to maintain his place and culture of the region by defending and managing acequias, maintaining seeds, and addressing difficulties of the times and our future such as from the nuclear industry, climate change, and a disconnection from nature and community.

Loving Our Changing Homelands is an NM PBS Our Land special produced by Laura Paskus, in which we learn how New Mexicans love and steward forests and watersheds that have changed dramatically in the past half-century due to warming, fire, flooding, and drought. This episode includes Paula Garcia, who is asked to reflect on how communities are caring for lands even as they change due to climate disasters such as the catastrophic Hermit's Peak Calf Canyon Fire.



Acequia Disaster Recovery after Wildfire and Floods

Acequia leaders will provide updates on recovery status and personal experiences in areas recently impacted by fire and flood, including HPCC, Gila, Ruidoso, and Rio Chama. A moderator will facilitate panelist questions and allow agency representatives and assistance providers to respond.
