

David Benavides

DAVID BENAVIDES is director of the land and water rights project for New Mexico Legal Aid, a position he has held for 35 years. He received both his B.S. and J.D. from the University of New Mexico, and, upon graduating from law school in 1990, was awarded a Skadden, Arps Public Interest Law Fellowship to begin his work with acequias and land grants on land and water rights in New Mexico. David has advised countless acequia officials on water rights protection methods and governance matters. His work has additionally included representing acequias in gaining legal recognition for their water rights and their historic water-use customs, and to have greater decision-making authority in local water decisions. He lives outside of Santa Fe, N.M.

Enrique Romero

Enrique Romero is an Assistant Attorney General and the Division Director of the Guadalupe Hidalgo Treaty Division of the New Mexico Department of Justice. After graduating law school from Notre Dame, Enrique joined New Mexico Legal Aid's Land and Water Project as a Thomas L. Schaffer Public Interest Law Fellow, focusing his work on acequia and land grant matters. After serving two and half years as a staff attorney at NMLA and under the mentorship of David Benavides, Enrique joined the New Mexico Acequia Association as a staff attorney, and later became its Director of Legal Services. Enrique has a decade of experience advising local government clients, including acequias, land grants and county government on various legal and policy issues. A native of Nambe and Espanola, Enrique enjoys spending his free time with his wife and son, gardening at his home on Santa Fe's Southside, and irrigating and working his small ranch in Llano de la Llegua, Taos County.

BREAKOUT SESSION 1: 10:00AM

LA ACEQUIA ES NUESTRA ESCUELA: PLACE-BASED EDUCATION FOR OUR COMMUNITIES

Educators and advocates will share updates on their work to create more opportunities for youth in New Mexico's public schools to learn through place-based education through educational materials and curriculum that integrate acequias and land grants into learning about language, science, and other subjects. Panelists will include educators who have integrated acequias and place-based learning into their teaching and advocates who are building institutional support at universities and in state agencies for education that is culturally responsive in our communities.

EL AGUA SE DEFIENDE:

This panel will include community leaders who are in active campaigns to protect water from commodification. This includes acequias fighting water transfers out of agriculture to commercial uses outside the acequia as well as communities resisting other types of commodification such as water transfers or appropriations for data centers, bottled water, etc. Participants will share their stories of organizing and strategizing to protect their water as well as an update on their struggle and calls for solidarity across different types of campaigns.

Her published works include the New York Times in the 2019 article "Work Songs of the Cowboy Poets". Olivia's flagship poem "Bendición del agua" was featured in the Western Folklife Center's "Moving Rural Verse" series in 2017 honoring acequia culture. She continues her journey in reclaiming her language, seeds, and stories of resilience.

David Manzanares (he/him) and Maximiño Manzanares (she/they) are from Abiquiu, New Mexico. They are son and grandchild of Herman and Eleanor Manzanares. They and their family have been parciantes on the Abeyta-Trujillo Acequia for four generations. Their gift of music carries the tradition forward to the next generation.
